

The Stations of the Cross

"Were you there when they crucified my Lord?" This piercing question comes as the first line in a classic African-American spiritual, which is commonly sung on Good Friday. "Were you there when they nailed him to the tree?... Were you there when they laid him in the tomb?" In each verse, the speaker addresses us with new queries as though we were eyewitnesses of our Lord's death. A voice of lamentation rises in response: "Oh, sometimes it causes me to tremble, tremble, tremble..." The lyrics are short and simple, but each word carries a sense of gravitas. There is something about this beautiful hymn that moves beyond passive reflection to active participation. We feel as though we are fellow mourners with the disciples, standing side by side as we look with bitter sadness upon the wounded body of our loving Savior hanging from his cross.

For many of us, when the cross is stripped from its Biblical context, it becomes a homely, mundane object—a sort of 'decoration' that blends into the background of our lives. It appears as a pendant around our necks, as an emblem on the covers of our prayerbooks, and as an accessory upon the walls of our homes. But, the cross is no mere decoration. It is an instrument of Roman execution—a sinister mechanism of death, much like a guillotine or an electric chair. If we're not careful, we can develop a blasé attitude toward the cross, taking our Lord's sacrificial death for granted and finding ourselves disconnected from the emotional weight of Christ's suffering on our behalf. Much like a moving song, our method of prayer can be a remedy for this kind of indifference.

From the earliest days of Christianity, disciples of Jesus have ventured to Jerusalem to walk in the footsteps of Jesus. As a focus for prayer, it was common for pilgrims in past centuries to follow the Via Dolorosa or Way of Sorrows, a processional route that traditionally marks Christ's path to Golgotha as he carried his cross. But, not everyone had the physical means to travel. The Stations of the Cross originated in the Middle Ages as a way for Christian believers, who could not travel to Jerusalem itself, to share in this act of pilgrimage. Popularized by the Franciscans, it spread throughout Europe over the centuries, becoming an integral practice in Western Christian piety, especially during the penitential season of Lent.

The devotion is a form of meditation. It is deeply affective in character—engaging our emotions in the narrative of Christ's passion. Using our imaginations, we place ourselves in the shoes of our Lord's disciples and the other onlookers, meditating on Christ's sufferings as a way of reckoning with our sinfulness, deepening our appreciation for his loving sacrifice, and understanding the costliness of our salvation. Jesus said: "Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends." In dying, Jesus poured out his life as an offering to the Father. He took the penalty of our sin upon himself so that we might be reconciled to God through him. As we follow the cross in procession and pause at each station, our meditation is guided by excerpts from Scripture as well as a series of prayers that help us direct our attention to Christ in thanksgiving and worship, perhaps most notably the iconic prayer that introduces each station: "We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world."

This season of Lent, one of our men's groups, *Brothers in Faith*, has been leading Stations of the Cross every *Friday at 6pm* in the Cathedral Nave. Please consider joining us on *April 8* for our last session before Holy Week, and invite the Lord to deepen your appreciation for his sacrificial love.

40 Days for Life is an internationally coordinated 40-day campaign that aims to end abortion locally through prayer and fasting, community outreach, and a peaceful all-day vigil in front of abortion businesses. The 40 Days for Life 2022 Spring Campaign in Tallahassee began on *Ash Wednesday, 2 March* and continues through *Palm Sunday, 10 April*. The public prayer vigil is held in the public right-of-way outside the Planned Parenthood facility 12 hours each day from 7am to 7pm, during the 40-day campaign.


