

Refugees Among Us

Like many, I watched news coverage of Afghans desperately trying to board planes to escape the Taliban, and Ukrainians driven from their homes by war and found myself increasingly moved to do something. But beyond just writing a check to a relief organization, I felt the Holy Spirit calling me to relationship—to encounter the refugees in our midst.

That calling led my husband, Matt, and me to get involved with a small group of volunteers who were helping a local refugee resettlement agency meet families' critical needs. It led us to an extended stay hotel room, where we delivered a grocery order and toys to a Syrian couple with seven children, who were in Tallahassee temporarily until they could get transportation to a city where they had a support group of friends and family. The children's faces lit up as they played with the baby dolls and stuffed animals and bubble wands. Speaking through a translation app on his phone, the dad told me his children had never seen common toys, since they grew up in a refugee camp in Jordan.

It led us to meet another large Syrian family and help them find the bikes they needed for transportation, desks for the children to work at, and a pantry shelf to hold their dry goods.

And it led us to meet an El Salvadoran family at a "pop up shop" staged to help local refugees find needed household items, when their precious little girl pointed to bread we were bagging up and asked if her family could have it. When we later learned that they were sitting on outdoor folding chairs in their living room, we brought them a couch and a recliner that a neighbor was giving away. Which has led to tomorrow's Make Art Monday with the Guevara family! God is drawing us into community with one another!

Without a doubt, this has been the most rewarding volunteer work we've ever done, because it involves not just philanthropy but fellowship.

DEUTERONOMY 10:18 tells us to "defend the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and love the foreigner residing among you, giving them food and clothing," and MATTHEW 25 reminds us that when we care for the foreigners among us, we actually do it for Jesus Himself.

We have a tremendous opportunity to fulfill this scriptural directive by engaging with the more than 90 refugee families who live in our midst here in Tallahassee.

Members of St. Peter's have been walking alongside local refugee families and helping them experience the love of Christ through our fellowship and assistance. Our church has made financial contributions to help these families build stability as they move toward independence. We can always use more cathedral volunteers with a heart for this ministry to form a personal relationship and help however we're needed, which may include teaching English, locating needed household items, navigating bureaucratic processes and medical appointments, getting ready for the new school year, and more.

MIDDLE & HIGH SCHOOL MINISTRY | JUNE 14-JULY 12

Rising 6th-12th Grades

Join us in the Choir Room for an exciting short series, "God's Beauty for the Bored" this summer. Even if you can only make it one week this summer, it'll be worthwhile. We will be looking at several topics, such as: why church often feels boring, how to pick a church when you go off to college, why the bulletin includes space for "sermon notes," and more.

PRAYING BY THE BOOK: PRAYING WITH THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER

Led by Fr. Michael Petty

The Book of Common Prayer is designed to help us "pray with the Church" both publicly and privately and, thus, functions as a "school of prayer". After presenting a theology of Christian prayer, this class will help participants make use of the Book of Common Prayer to develop a deeper prayer life. The class will help participants live into the Anglican practice of balancing "common prayer" and private prayer so that they mutually enrich one another. The resource book for this class is Romano Guardini's <u>The Spirit of the Liturgy and The Lord's Prayer (available in St. Peter's Bookstore)</u>.

PRAYERS OF THE NEW TESTAMENT | JUNE 14-JULY 19

One of the ways we can learn to pray is by praying the prayers in Scripture. This class will focus on some of the most important prayers of the New Testament with the idea that they can each form us as praying people. Each class session will be devoted to one New Testament prayer. We will begin with the prayer of Mary (the Magnificat) and move on to consider the prayer of Jesus for his disciples (John 17:1-26), Paul's prayer for the Ephesians (Ephesians 3:7-21) and his prayer for wisdom (Colossians 1:1-14). The class will conclude with a consideration of Revelation 1:9-20. The resource book for this class is <u>Prayers of the New Testament</u> by Lynne Baab (available in St. Peter's Bookstore). Note: this class will conclude on July 19.

PRAYING THE PSALMS | JUNE 14-JULY 19

The Psalter has been referred to as the "Prayer Book of Israel" in that each psalm is a prayer to God under different circumstances and for different reasons. This class will introduce participants to the practice of praying the psalms as part of their personal prayer life. The class will operate as a group Bible study with each session focused on a particular psalm. Each psalm will provide a model for a kind of prayer, including a prayer of dependance, a prayer of trust, a prayer of distress, a prayer of gratitude, a prayer of grief, and a prayer of hope. The resource book for this class is <u>Praying the Psalms</u> by Juanita Ryan (available in St. Peter's Bookstore). Note: this class will conclude on July 19.

PRAYER & LISTENING

For some Christians, prayer is a means of getting God to do their will. This is a habit that is easy to fall into. However, God created us for a relationship with himself and this requires that we listen to him. This class will function as a group Bible study with each session focused on a passage from Scripture. The class will explore such topics as conversation with God, praying with authenticity, prayers of request, listening to God in prayer, praying for others (intercessory prayer) and practicing God's presence. 
