THE KEYS CALLED TO MINISTRY

MORE THAN 'GOOD PREACHING

Sometimes it seems as if I was the last person to know that I would go into ministry. When I told my old student minister—I graduated two years prior and had spent that time volunteering for him—that I thought God was calling me into ministry, he knowingly smiled and said, "I'm not surprised." When I told my parents, afraid that they would be upset with me for changing my career path, they too knowingly smiled and said, "We wondered how long it would take." Even the pastor of a country church I briefly attended as a first grader looked at me in my child-sized suit and clip-on Looney Tunes tie and told my Mom, "He's gonna grow up to be a preacher some day."

Even so, the path to ministry has not been a clear and paved one for me. My family spent most of my childhood out of church, and I did not even become a Christian until the summer between my sophomore and junior years of high school. That most transforming event took place just before the height of my rebellious season in life, which took God's kind hand of discipline to bring me to His senses and set my life aright. This was a hard time in my life, but I'm grateful for it nonetheless—*felix culpa*.

Looking back, I can see that God had a plan all along (surprise, surprise). He brought my family to a church which would pour into me, particularly through the student minister, who gave me and many others myriad opportunities to serve and grow in our gifting. Whether it was through teaching Sunday school, leading teams at camp, or even preaching at the student services, he provided space in which to minister and support along the way. Once I got to Bible college, I was put on a preaching rotation for a local retirement community, and Sunday pulpit supply opportunities were opened up to me through supportive adjunct professors. This trend would follow me to seminary in St. Louis, where I've learned a still more important aspect of ministry.

Until my time at Covenant Theological Seminary, the goal has been to be the best preacher I can be, but Covenant showed me the importance of the minister's role as an image of the Suffering Servant, who "sustains with a word him who is weary" and does not break a bruised reed, but is "gentle and lowly in heart." St. Peter's has helped build upon and strengthen this importance, for which I am deeply grateful.

This summer fellowship has been another key point in my ministerial training. Here, I have found support from priests and parishioners alike, and I have been exposed to many areas of pastoral ministry in addition to learning how to preach Anglican homilies. A crucial component to success in any area of life is the cycle of going out and trying new things on one's own and then returning to a supportive place where reflection and improvement can be honed. With much encouragement and guidance, St. Peter's has provided a space for me to do so; thank you for your support!
